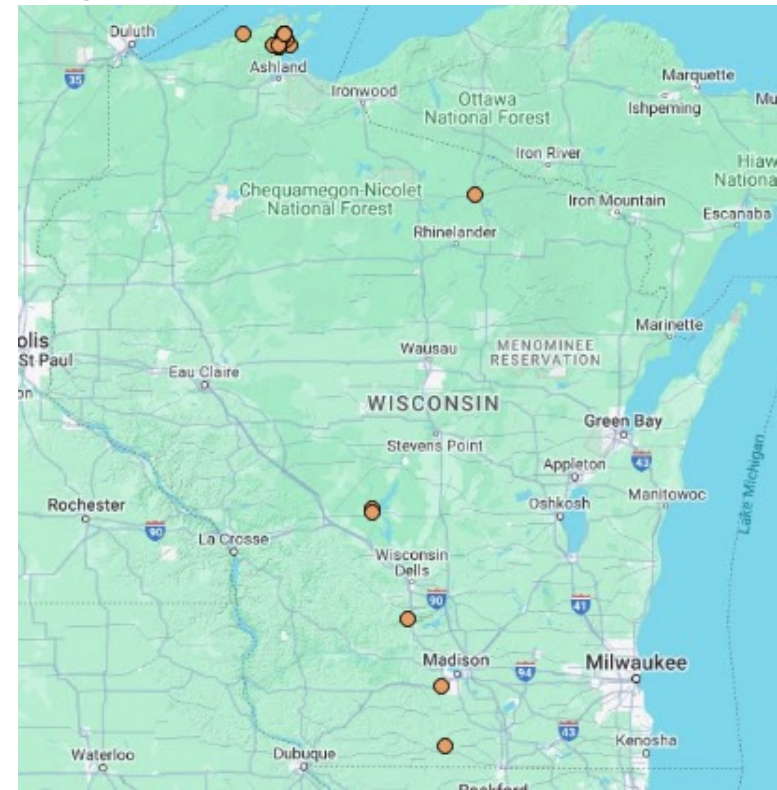


Dalmatian toadflax (*Linaria dalmatica*)



- Deep-rooted, waxy-blue plants resembling snap-dragons
- Habitats it invades:
 - Grasslands
 - Roadsides
- Status
 - Wisconsin: Prohibited/Restricted
 - Regulated in: MN

Dalmatian toadflax (*Linaria dalmatica*)

Leaves alternate, simple

- 2" long, triangular leaves with pointed tips
- Leaves waxy/bluish, slightly clasping the stems
- Spreads via deep roots and rhizomes





Dalmatian toadflax (*Linaria dalmatica*)

Flower/fruit

- Flowers are bright yellow, 2-lipped, with a long spur at the base
- Flowers from May-Aug.
- Fruit is a plump capsule





Dalmatian toadflax look alike

Dalmatian toadflax (*Linaria dalmatica*) closely resembles butter-and-eggs (*Linaria vulgaris*) (N-N) as well as cultivated snapdragons (*Antirrhinum* spp.) (N-N). It differs most notably from both in its **clasping, waxy, triangular leaves**.

Butter and eggs (N-N) has leaves that are bluish-green, but they are extremely narrow, unlike the broad, triangular leaves of Dalmatian toadflax.



Snapdragons (N-N) have leaves that are **not** bluish-green and that are more oval shaped. The flowers are **variously colored** and **lack a long spur**.
