
Forget-me-nots look alikes



Two species of forget-me-nots are invasive in Wisconsin: woodland forget-me-not (*Myosotis sylvatica*) and aquatic forget-me-not (*M. scorpioides*). They look very similar to each other and to other forget-me-nots in Wisconsin: the native small forget-me-not (*M. laxa*) and non-native field forget-me-not (*M. arvensis*). Forget-me-nots can be distinguished from each other based on characteristics of the calyx (green, leaf-like cup below the flower) and hairs.

AQUATIC FORGET-ME-NOT calyx has lobes shorter than the calyx tube. Hairs are straight and flattened against the plant.



calyx has lobes about equal in length to the calyx tube. Hairs are spreading, some minutely hooked.





WOODLAND FORGET-ME-NOT calyx has lobes longer than the calyx tube. Hairs are spreading, some minutely hooked.



small forget-me-not calyx has lobes about equal in length to the calyx tube. Hairs are straight and flattened against the plant.
